Editorial

This newsletter is the last one to be published during the Brazilian mandate of the International Secretariat (IS) of the World March of Women. In January 2014, the IS will be transferred to Mozambique.

Our experience during this period of a little over seven years demonstrates just how a change of this magnitude - which implies dealing with new political cultures and forms of action - is positive for the movement. Since 2006, when the IS moved from Quebec to Brazil, we have been able to continue using the WMW's consensus-building method. These consensuses are reflected in the documents that are part of our history and our records, and strengthen our identity and common political platforms. We have shared responsibilities more with the WMW's International Committee members and other activists in the March in terms of following-up on the building of both our movement and processes developed in alliance with mixed movements, which helps them to incorporate feminist analyses and practices. We have won greater recognition from society as a whole and from institutions. While there is still a lot to do, we are certain that the transition of the IS will revitalise us and help us to move forward.

Over the next few months, our challenge as a movement will be to ensure the effective transition of the IS, while at the same time, we organise our Fourth International Action. This action is seen as a process in which feminist political training and communications will be particularly strategic. And our sisters in Mozambique, led by Graça Samo, are certain that they have the support of the entire movement in facing this challenge.



We say goodbye to the task of hosting the IS, but not to our activism within the WMW. Since the 9th International Meeting in Brazil, we have dedicated ourselves to organising the records of the work carried out in recent years, as well as frequent conversations with our Mozambican sisters in order to transfer knowledge we have accumulated. We have also worked on fundraising in order to avoid any interruptions.

Without setting our future tasks aside, the majority of this newsletter is dedicated to creating a visual record

that celebrates some of our mandate's key moments, as part of the historical, collective resistance and affirmation of WMW alternatives that we helped to build and will continue to build until all women and peoples are free!

São Paulo, August 2013: the 9th International Meeting brought together 1 650 women from 50 countries and offered training and space for exchanges and demonstrating solidarity with the struggle of women from around the world, under the slogan: "Feminism on the March to Change the World!"

Third International Action



March 2010: the Third International Action in Brazil brought together 3 000 women who marched approximately 120 km in over 10 days, between the cities of Campinas and São Paulo.



June 2010, Philippines: Regional Meeting marks the actions of the Asia-Oceania region



June 2010, Istanbul, Turkey: the action united women from different countries in conflict in Europe in a context of growing militarisation and conservative nationalist and fundamentalist offensive



August 2010, Colombia: solidarity missions, conference and mobilisation in front of the Palanquero military base mark the Women and People's Summit of the Americas against Militarisation, regional moment of action in the Americas





October 17th, 2010, Bukavu, province of Sud Kivu, in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC): more than 20 000 people participated in the demonstration that marked the closing event of the WMW's Third International Action. The international delegation present there reached a total of over 220 women from 41 countries, who were able to denounce the economic causes behind the war in the DRC and their consequences and show support for local women fighting to change their situation. It was the first time we, from the WMW, organised an international action in a territory in conflict. Towards the 4th International Action: news from Europe and the Americas!

WMW National Coordinating Bodies (NCBs) from different regions have already begun their preparations for the 4th International Action. In **Europe**, they met in early October in Brussels, Belgium, where they decided to organise a feminist caravan. The caravan will start on March 8th, 2015 in London (United Kingdom) and end in Portugal on October 17th. Feminist training, cultural activities and a map of feminist alternatives being developed on the continent will be created as the caravan makes its way throughout Europe, meeting grassroots women in urban and rural areas along the way. Each NCB is currently dedicated to preparing detailed proposals on the various activities that will be part of the caravan.

In the build-up to the action, there will be several important moments for mobilisations and encounters between activists: in February, in Switzerland, young feminists are planning an activity to continue the work on attacks on the right to and access to abortion in Europe. A conference on care work is being organised in Germany in March. From June 4th to 6th, 2014, Sarajevo, in Bosnia-Herzegovina, will host a Thematic Social Forum on peace. As the WMW, we will try to organise a session on criminalisation, militarisation and violence (one of the four pillars of our 2015 action) in the forum. The Forum will also be an opportunity to organise our participant groups in the region, in particular, in the lead-up to 2015. In addition to discussing the action, the Europeans elected Clara Carbunar, from the France NCB, to be the region's substitute in the WMW's International Committee (IC). Participation in the European Secretariat was also renewed and broadened. The next meeting of the WMW's European coordinating team will be held in Basque Country next year.

The NCBs from the **Americas** region have also already held their first online meeting (via skype) at the end of October. During the meeting, they shared information on national actions in which the WMW in their countries are involved and briefly assessed the 9th International Meeting. As part of their follow-up tasks from the Meeting, sisters from the Americas committed themselves to sending information to the IC and the IS on the training processes they carry out in their countries, and on the situation of lesbians. This compilation of information from the region will be used for the planning of the activities of the International Committee and Secretariat in the future. With regards to the 2015 action, NCBs are to put forward detailed proposals by March, which include estimates of the costs of holding caravans and meetings by sub-region. They are also to share news on resistance struggles and the alternatives that women are building in their own context. These will serve as input for the meeting of the entire IC, which is scheduled to be held in May 2014. NCBs from the Americas have scheduled their next online meeting for February.
